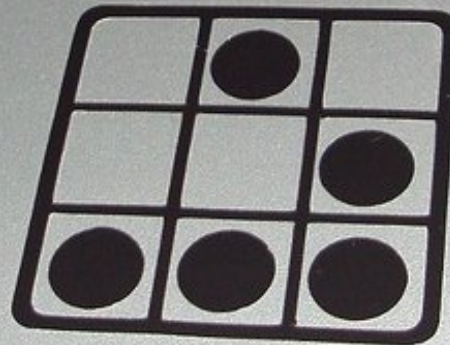


# Structure in a formalized entity

- Required



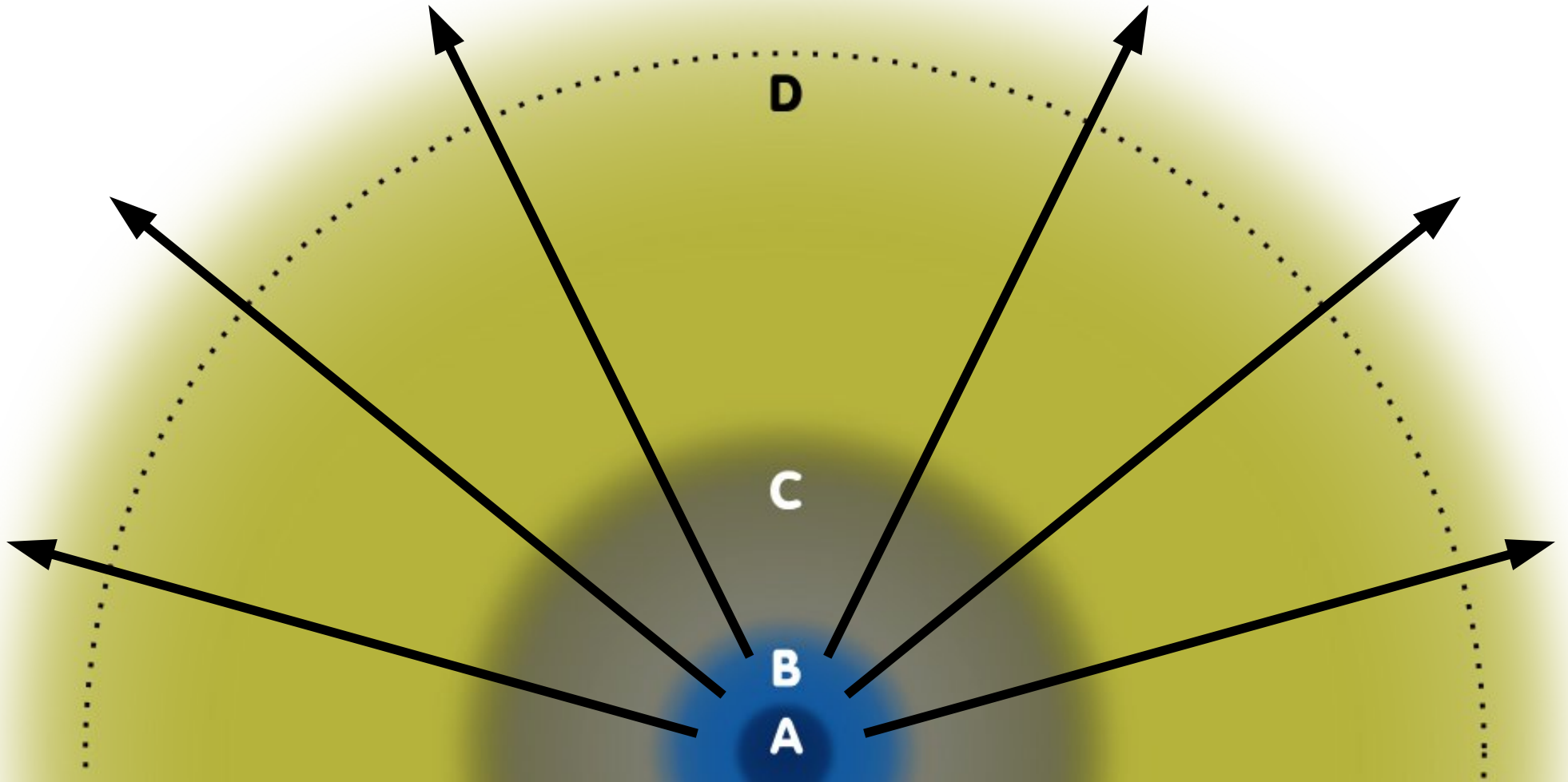


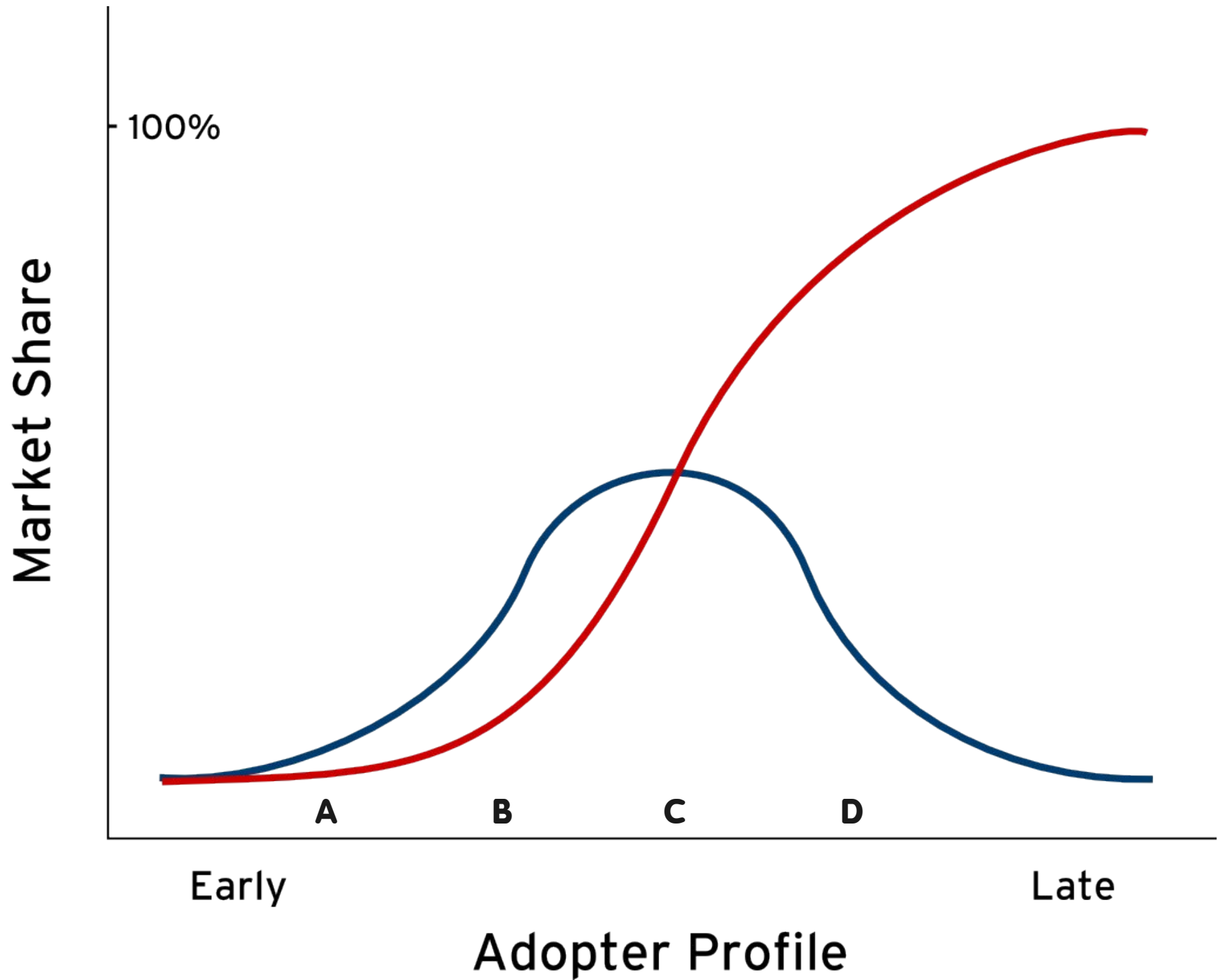
